

Voter ID Requirements for In-Person Voting

No updates required since May 15, 2025

Background

In a majority of states, voters show some form of identification when casting their ballot inperson. States that do not require some form of ID typically ask for a signature or other identifying information to confirm the voter's eligibility. Our scoring gives negative points to states that have unnecessarily strict identification requirements or procedures in place that create barriers for eligible voters who may not be able to obtain a specific form of required ID. These overly strict procedures usually require very limited forms of ID and/or burdensome additional steps to be taken by the voter after Election Day to ensure their vote is counted. These laws do not apply to mail/absentee voting, or first-time voters who did not provide ID when registering to vote by mail. For more information please contact your local election official

Scoring

- No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means, 1 point
- Non-strict, non-photo ID (ID requested, but voter can cast regular ballot without), 1 point.
- Non-strict, photo ID (ID requested, but voter can cast regular ballot without), ½ point
- Strict, non-photo ID (ID required, voter cannot cast regular ballot without), -1/2 point
- Strict photo ID (ID required, voter cannot cast regular ballot without), -1 point

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voters must state their name and sign the poll book (D.C. Mun. Regs. § 3-700).

• Non-strict, photo ID (Fla. Stat. § 101.043).

Georgia (-1)

• Strict photo ID (Ga. Code Ann. § 21-2-417).

Hawaii (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. No additional steps to cast a ballot if voter does not have requested ID (<u>Haw. Rev. Stat. § 11-136</u>).

Idaho (1/2)

• Non-strict, photo ID (<u>Idaho Code §§ 34-1113</u>, <u>34-1114</u>).

Illinois (1)

 No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voters must state their name and may be requested to sign an affidavit of eligibility (<u>10 III. Comp. Stat. 5/17-9</u>).

Indiana (-1)

• Strict photo ID (Ind. Code §§ 3-5-2-40.5, 3-10-1-7.2, 3-11-8-25.1).

Iowa (-1/2)

• Strict, non-photo ID (<u>lowa Code §§ 49.78, 48A.7A, 48A.10A, 49.81</u>).

Kansas (-1)

• Strict photo ID (Kan. Stat. Ann. § 25-2908).

Kentucky (1/2)

• Non-strict, photo ID (Ky. Rev. Stat. Ann. §§ 117.375, 117.227).

Louisiana (1/2)

• Non-strict, photo ID (<u>La. Stat. Ann. § 18:562</u>).



Maine (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voter must state their name and may be requested to state their address (Me. Stat. tit. 21-A, §671).

Maryland (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voter must state their date of birth and may be required to state their address (Md. Code Ann., Elec. Law § 10-310).

Massachusetts (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voter must their name and address if requested (Mass. Gen. Laws Ch. 54, § 76).

Michigan (1/2)

• Non-strict, photo ID (Mich. Comp. Laws § 168.523).

Minnesota (1)

No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voter must sign the polling
place roster and state their personal information if requested (Minn. Stat. § 204C.10).

Mississippi (-1)

Strict photo ID (Miss. Code Ann. § 23-15-563).

Missouri (-1)

• Strict photo ID (Mo. Rev. Stat. § 115.427).

Montana (-1)

• Strict photo ID (Mont. Code Ann. § 13-13-114).

Nebraska (1/2)

 Non-strict, photo ID. Voter can execute reasonable impediment statement under a range of exceptions if lacking ID (Neb. Rev. Stat. § 32-913).

Nevada (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voter must provide their name and an affirmation (Nev. Rev. Stat. § 293.277).

New Hampshire (-1)

Strict photo ID (NH HB 1569 (2024)).



New Jersey (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voter must sign the poll book (N.J. Stat. Ann. § 19:15-17).

New Mexico (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voter must confirm personal information (N.M. Stat. Ann. §§ 1-1-24, 1-12-7.1, 1-12-10, and 1-12-4.1).

New York (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voter must sign the poll book (N.Y. Elec. Law § 8-304).

North Carolina (1/2)

• Non-strict, photo ID. Voter can execute a reasonable impediment statement under a range of exceptions if they do not have ID. (N.C. Gen. Stat. § 163-166.16).

North Dakota (-1/2)

• Non-strict, photo ID (N.D. Cent. Code § 16.1-01).

Ohio (-1)

Strict photo ID (Ohio Rev. Code Ann. § 3503.19).

Oklahoma (1/2)

Non-strict, photo ID (<u>Okla. Stat. tit. 26, § 7-114</u>).

Oregon (1)

No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means (Or. Rev. Stat. § 254.470).

Pennsylvania (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voters must sign an affidavit and provide their address (<u>Penn. Elect. Code §1.3.1210</u>).

Rhode Island (1/2)

• Non-strict, photo ID (<u>17 R.I. Gen. Laws § 17-19-24.2</u>).

South Carolina (1/2)

Non-strict, photo ID (<u>S.C. Code Ann. § 7-13-710</u>).



South Dakota (1/2)

• Non-strict, photo ID (S.D. Codified Laws § 12-18-6.1).

Tennessee (-1)

• Strict photo ID (Tenn. Code Ann. § 2-7-112).

Texas (1/2)

• Non-strict, photo ID (<u>Tex. Elec. Code Ann. §§ 63.001, 63.0101</u>).

Utah (-1/2)

• Strict, non-photo ID (<u>Utah Code Ann. § 20A-1-102</u>).

Vermont (1)

• No ID required, but voter eligibility is verified through other means. Voter must state their name and address if requested (Vt. Stat. Ann. tit. 17, § 2563).

Virginia (1)

Non-strict, non-photo ID (<u>Va. Code Ann. § 24.2-643</u>).

Washington (1)

• Non-strict, non-photo ID (Wash. Rev. Code § 29A.40.160).

West Virginia (1)

• Non-strict, photo ID (W. Va. Code § 3-1-34).

Wisconsin (-1)

• Strict photo ID (Wis. Stat. § 6.79).

Wyoming (-1)

- Strict photo ID (<u>Wyo. Stat. Ann. § 22-1-102</u>).
